

A Mid-Term Reflection on Nativity

As we move into summer, it is a good time for us to reflect on how Nativity is doing during this interim period. In terms of worship attendance, financial giving and general morale, we are doing well. When I look at Nativity, I see a vital, healthy church with some of the finest Christians I have been blessed to know. This church is doing amazing things that make me convinced that the Spirit of God is working mightily among us.

- The number of parishioners involved in mission and outreach is impressive, and donations to various projects, whether of time, talent or treasure, are generous.
- Our new Music Director Juliana Witt is doing a stellar job in expanding our musical repertoire and leading our outstanding choir.
- Dr. Wayne's Bible studies continue to attract learners and seekers. The quality of these Bible studies is second to none of any parish in the diocese.
- Family ministry is undergoing a transition now that Shelley Byrnes has moved to a new position in Illinois, but I have just called a superb candidate as her replacement Mandy Hodges, who will begin her duties on July 1. Mandy will be present for Vacation Bible School which will take place in July 16-20.
- Lay ministry continues to flourish with many volunteers, committees, ministries and small groups from newcomers, communications, prayer and worship ministries to our shepherds and Ones and Twos home gatherings.
- Our parish deacons, Martha and Bob, along with our Lay Eucharistic Ministers, insure that every member in need of ministry is cared for.
- Our beautiful facilities are well-maintained, with renovations and repairs promptly done.
- Our Parish Administrator, part-time though she is, manages to publish a first-rate monthly newsletter, a Sunday worship bulletin and PowerPoint, as well as sending out Tuesday and Thursday e-mails to parishioners.
- Our Search Committee is busy at work and preparing to receive names and interview candidates.

I anticipate that Nativity will be a highly desirable parish for any priest looking for a new position. In fact, I think Nativity will be in the top ten percent of churches that are most likely to attract the best candidates. The Rector position is now advertised on the national Church website with a closing date of June 24. When the search committee receives the list of names from the diocese, the selection of candidates to interview by Skype will begin. Be patient as the process unfolds – good things take time. In the end, I am optimistic that the right person will be called as Rector – as you should be too!

With all that Nativity has to offer, and all that Nativity has accomplished in the last ten years, I think we have something very special in this parish. We have a competent staff, conscientious Vestry and Wardens, committed lay leadership, dedicated volunteers and a parish family committed to being an inclusive and compassionate community transforming lives in Jesus.

Christ brought us together. Christ holds us together. Christ will keep us together in all our splendid diversity. My hope is that your next Rector will be a person who has Christ as the center of his or her life. As St. Gregory of Nyssa preached, "Keep your eyes on Christ."

Methodist Bishop Gerald Kennedy, in his book The Seven Words of the Minister, told something he had heard during his youth from a great Baptist pastor he admired in Oakland, California. It was an account of three ministers the pastor had known.

The first minister seemed to say, "Here I am; do all you can for me." Strangely enough, because the man was gifted and brilliant and made a wonderful impression on the people, this is precisely what they did. They glorified the minister instead of Christ.

The second minister seemed to say to the church, "Here I am; let me serve you." They were willing to let him serve them; and serve them he did. There was nothing too large or small for him to try to do for them. He lived for years at their beck and call, running errands, chairing meetings, visiting the sick, moving tables in the church hall, chauffeuring people. Whenever there was a task to be done, the people assumed that the minister was the one to do it.

But there was a third minister who came to the church and seemed to say, "Here is Jesus Christ; let us serve him together." The minister kept everybody's eyes on Christ – not on him and not on themselves, but on Christ. Whatever happened, he always quietly directed their attention again to the one to whom they all belonged and needed to serve, so that eventually each person felt a new call to his own ministry under Christ and the church. They became involved in the kingdom's work both within and beyond the church walls.



"This," said Bishop Kennedy "is the task of the pastor."

I hope that kind of ministry happens at Nativity under your new Rector. All of us in this church should be servants of Jesus, and Nativity should be a servant church, bending its great gifts and possibilities to the use of the kingdom. In this church, we:

- Face tomorrow in the power of God's love.
- Hear all voices and needs all gifts.
- Cultivate the same love and openness to all people that our great God has for us.

Let it be so, dear Lord, let it be so!

Page 4 Summer Music at Nativity

The summer is chill for music at Nativity. Not literally, of course (!), but fewer parishioners and my beloved choir on vacation means that there is time to take a closer look at getting to know you as a congregation.

Our beloved Hymnal 1982 that resides in our pews contains many jewels, and while it is already 36 years old, it contains a wonderful array of timeless styles and traditions. We, of course, have our favorites that create our strongest congregational singing. Priceless. I love congregational singing possibly more than anything else. Raising our voices together in song is an act of unity, much like singing the national anthem at the beginning of a ball game. It brings us to focus on the same message for a moment and fosters the possibility of blossoming

harmony. I like keeping our favorites in the lineup. I also make an effort to sprinkle something new here and there, sometimes to see if the congregation knows the hymn, and sometimes just because the message is entirely fitting. During these moments, I encourage you to look for the connection. I make a great effort to align with the service themes, using music to confirm certain truths. Other times, it's just a wonderfully constructed melody that's captured my ear.

With these thoughts in mind, I've designed a very simple interactive presentation about our hymnal that I will host over coffee on Saturday, June 30th, at 9:30am. We will discuss stories behind some of the oldest and newest hymns, examine some different styles and traditions represented in the hymnal and explain all the strange letters and numbers you find at the bottom of each page—a wonderful resource indeed! Following our discussion, I will take a few favorites and we will sing YOUR favorites together. Please RSVP to me so that refreshments can be planned accordingly.

Vivace and Allegretto will meet for a workshop to touch base and offer the opportunity to bring a friend (for a special prize!). I would love to see these children's choirs become community-engaged and really grow in the next year. If you know a child between the ages of 3 and 12 who might be interested, please have them reach out to me. We will learn about intervals visually and aurally as well as have a special composer story and experience a "Listen and Draw" session. I will also be directing music at Vacation Bible School July 16th-20th and hope to have Vivace, Allegretto and friends attend! Focusing on our youth is key to maintaining the life, vitality and future of our church community.

The upcoming Arts at Nativity season is slowly coming together. We are hoping to curate family concerts in addition to our traditional Veteran's Day, Christmas and Martin Luther King Concerts. I will engage with some local schools in music residencies that recruit to these events, and we want to make them interactive and family-friendly. This means that in addition to our grant applications, we will need even more financial support from donors and supporters, volunteers and our faithful people who put together all the beautiful receptions to meet and greet the artists. Please consider giving or sponsoring an Arts at Nativity concert so that we can offer high-quality engaging experiences to our local community. I am passionate about offering our unique, intimate space with the highest quality art as part of our purpose and pursuit.

The rest of my summer is busy planning anthems for adult and children's choirs in the 2018-2019 season, building schedules, planning training sessions and workshops, special guests and my favorite—filing! Brenda Burke is my loyal assistant during the year and helps to manage the plethora of choral papers and music, but I still have yet to incorporate my own organ library and develop a personal organizational system for my office. That is one of my continuing summer projects!

If you'd like to be a part of the music ministry in some capacity, please let me know. There are lots of opportunities of all kinds and the more, the merrier!

Welcome Mandy Hodges!

With the approval of Vestry, I am pleased to announce that I have called as our new Christian Formation Director, Mandy Hodges.

Mandy is originally from Georgia where she studied at Georgia College and State University, obtaining a Bachelor of Science in Psychology. She and her husband found their way to Phoenix where she became the full-time Director of Student Ministries at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Chandler. At St. Matthew's she planned and directed youth programs that served over 100 families, recruited and trained adult youth leaders, and organized opportunities for youth to serve the community and become advocates for social justice. She also oversaw the duties of the Children's Ministry Director, including Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and Nursery Care.

In 2014 Mandy was called as the full-time Minister of Youth, Children and Families at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Alexandria, Virginia – one of the premier churches in the Diocese of Virginia. There she planned and directed youth programs that served 150 families and organized weekly Sunday School classes for over 200 families. She coordinated the youth confirmation classes, recruited and trained youth group leaders, Sunday School teachers, Vacation Bible School staff and Confirmation teachers. She also organized and led international youth mission trips and pilgrimages each summer. In addition to these responsibilities, Mandy also served as Chaplain to the St. Paul's Day School, leading a weekly gathering throughout the school year.

We at Nativity are very blessed to have Mandy join our ministry team, and I know that parishioners will be delighted to have her in the parish, along with her husband and daughter.

Mandy will begin her duties on Sunday, July 1 when we celebrate Independence Day at both worship services. During the announcements I will call Mandy to the lectern so that she can introduce herself. I think you will find her to be a lively, vivacious, caring and genuinely warm human being with a heart for children, youth and young adults.



New Rector Search Update

The posting for the position of Nativity's next Rector has been "live" for almost two weeks now. This process is coordinated through the Diocese, and our Search Committee has received valuable and ongoing counsel and assistance from Canon Megan Traquair and Canon Frank Clark. Resumes/applications for the position are received by the Diocese. While it is Diocesan policy not to release the names, or a count, of applicants while the posting is open, Canon Megan – who is in charge of this process at the Diocese – indicates that "there have been some very high quality candidates who have expressed interest in our position." The posting will remain open until later this month, so we should all remain positive that the level of interest, and the quality of those interested, will remain strong. We also can all feel very good that the "Parish Profile" posted on the Diocesan site – and is read by those interested in our position – is in great part the product of our congregation's "Day of Discovery." We will keep you posted as this exciting process goes forward.

Wayne's World June/July 2018

The book of Genesis has served as a topic of fascination for people of faith for hundreds of years. Quite unintentionally it finds itself at the center of a whirlwind of controversy in competing theological interpretive circles. Sadly, with the interpretations popularized by the intolerant modern fundamentalist movement, it has been relegated to a joke in the mind of many who don't do the hard work to get at the eternal truths ensconced in its 50 chapters. Genesis, at its heart, is the story of all of us, both as individuals and as a collective people. The

story of the creation of Adam and Eve is your story and my story. The story of the 7 days of creation presents clues about how we should value, cherish, and celebrate God's self-manifestation in the material world. The Abraham narratives tell of a man of bold faith embracing the call of a God he couldn't see. The Jacob stories relate how the divine plan endures especially in the arena of conflict. The Joseph saga relates the hidden power of God's call when life is being particularly cruel.


Genesis abides as a testament to a very young understanding of God as a heavenly parent, a way of knowing that all of us cycle through as we grow to maturity in faith.

I invite you to see yourself in the Genesis story. Come be a part of our exploration of Genesis on Wednesday nights at 6:30 all summer long. Your relationship to this most known book of the Bible will be transformed by your interaction with it as the Holy Spirit continues to mold you into the likeness of who you truly are.

The Day of Discovery - Part 2

Now that our parish has gone through the Day of Discovery - discerning who we are and what we want in our next Rector - the time has come for us, the members of Nativity, to take the next step.

On Sunday, October 21, parishioners will have the opportunity to participate in a S.H.A.P.E. workshop to learn more about ourselves, who we are and what we should be doing with our lives. This workshop will have immense value to any parishioner of any age from 6th grade through retirement and will be useful to you in your secular activities as well as with the church. People in the workforce will find it particularly helpful.

S.H.A.P.E. is an acronym that stands for:

Spiritual Gifts

Heart

Abilities

Personality Type

Experiences

The workshop is divided into three sections. Section 1 focuses on spiritual gifts in which participants will take a spiritual gift inventory to discover their gifts. These are the gifts or skills that allow you to excel in what God has called you to do.

Section 2 focuses on personality type. Parishioners will take a min-version of the Myers-Briggs Personality Inventory to discern the kind of person they are: introvert/extrovert; thinker/feeler; sensor/intuitive; judger/perceiver. Knowing your Myers-Briggs letters can make a profound difference in how you relate to and experience the world.

Section 3 uses your personality type to discern your spiritual type – how you best experience God, what type of religious practices are most suited for you, and what kind of spirituality is most right for you. Many people who learn their spiritual type undergo a spiritual renewal and begin to relate to God with a new freedom and confidence.

The workshop concludes with a brief presentation on "vocation" or our calling in life. Once we know our spiritual gifts, our personality type and our spiritual type, it becomes easier for us to discern our vocation – what God is calling us to do at this stage of our lives.

As we prepare for our new Rector, it is important for all of us to know our S.H.A.P.E. – both for the good of ourselves and the good of our parish. After all, St. Paul reminds us that we are all members of the body of Christ, and that each member of the body is as important as any other member. When we all use our S.H.A.P.E. together, when we are in sync with one another, complementing one another with our gifts and personalities, the church becomes all that God has called it to be.

There will be more details about the workshop in the August, September and October newsletters, but mark October 21 on your calendar. It will be a rewarding and enriching day for all who attend.

After the Day of the Discovery there was no doubt that communication is a top priority for Nativity members. In response, a Communication Committee was formed and empowered by the Vestry and Father Gary to focus on coordinating church communication to parishioners and the community.

The Committee's mission is simply: "To oversee a robust evolving communications platform to meet Nativity's current and future needs for the next 3-5 years".

The goals are to:

- Analyze existing Communications issues.
- Define and correct near term deficiencies.
- Estimate communications needs of the church in the 3-5 year period.
- Develop a plan with resources and cost estimates for achievement of long-range plan.

We will do this in three phases spanning the next 18-24 months.

Phase 1. We will do a thorough review of the internal channels of communication (web, bulletins, newsletters, etc.) for accuracy, relevance, and processes. We will update/correct as needed, seek volunteers to work on communication projects, and create metrics of success. (0-6 months from March of 2018)

Phase 2. We will develop an understanding of the communication needs of the parish, both inside and outside the church (such as print media, social media, etc.). From that, a recommendation will be made to the Vestry on how to move forward. (6-12 months from Phase 1)

Phase 3. We will work with the new Rector to develop an organizational design that supports our mission and presents a growth centered image of who we are to our members and the community at large. (TBD)

This is a big task that will require many hands from our current ministry leaders and new volunteers to take on some future opportunities as Nativity grows. Please join us in the ministry of communication with your prayers and personal engagement. Contact any of us with questions or how to get involved.

Many Episcopalians are familiar with the "Three-Legged Stool" of Anglicanism: Scripture, Tradition and Reason. But did you know there is another "Three-Legged Stool" essential for the health of any parish?

One leg is for our annual giving to the parish – our pledges, tithes and offerings. Another leg is for giving to special events and causes and donating to capital campaigns for mission and maintenance. The third leg is legacy or insuring that our parish continues to benefit from our generosity after we are gone. This is what we call planned giving, and it is this third leg that I want to encourage you to consider.

Planned giving can take many forms, either an outright gift or bequest, making the church the beneficiary of an insurance policy, or establishing a charitable remainder trust or some other legal vehicle to insure your giving doesn't stop when you die. My point here is not to go through the different types of planned gifts that are available to you, but to prod you into getting started.

Nativity is a new parish – just ten years old – but it has come a long way. We are destined to be one of the major churches in the Diocese of Arizona. After all, we have an incredibly dedicated membership, no debt, a fully-paid contemporary church campus, a talented staff, and we exist in one of the most prosperous and growing areas in the entire state. Nativity is destined to grow and become a great church.

But for growth to take place, it will require sustained support on our part, including planned gifts. We will need to build an endowment (something that we do not have now) to have a solid financial foundation in doing the mission and ministry that God calls this church to do. We also want to make sure that we maintain our church campus as it ages and needs repair. Having an endowment will go a long way to insuring that this church will be a healthy and vibrant center of ministry for a very long time.

At this point, we have several members of the parish who have joined the Legacy Society, but your participation is vital. Won't you consider bequeathing a portion of your estate to Nativity so that the good work begun here may continue?

Stewardship Reminder



First Tuesday of the month at Nativity, is our Bag A Meal Outreach for the Homeless through the Phoenix Rescue Mission.



Vacation Bible School


