

The Episcopal Church of the Nativity Minutes of the 2019 Annual Parish Meeting January 26, 2020

<u>Call to Order & Determination of a Quorum</u> – Fr. Scot McComas, the Rector, called the annual meeting to order and determined there were 109 people present and thus a quorum was established.

Opening Prayer - Fr. Scot opened with prayer at 11:29 am.

<u>Election of a Secretary/Clerk</u> – A motion was made by Jan Dunkelberg to elect Cheryle Dunkelberg the Secretary/Clerk of the Annual Meeting. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

<u>Approval of the 2018 Annual Parish Meeting Minutes</u> - A motion was made by Edward James to approve the Minutes of the 2018 Annual Parish Meeting, held on January 27, 2019. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

<u>Identification of Present Vestry Members</u> – Fr. Scot introduced the present vestry members Suzanne Cohen, Senior Warden; Warren Sambach, Junior Warden, Art Graf, Treasurer; Sarah Banks, Jon Bost, Margaret Cohea, Bill Deihl, Norma Hyatt, Paul Rank, and Cheryle Dunkelberg, Vestry Clerk. Fr. Scot and thanked those who were rotating off the vestry and presented a gift each to Suzanne Cohen and Warren Sambach.

<u>Senior Warden Report</u> – Senior Warden Suzanne Cohen gave her report (which is also in the booklet). She acknowledged the great job and help given by the Search Committee and the Vestry over the last year during the search process for a rector. Suzanne indicated, "We have in place the right people for the right jobs to take us into the future." She also gave special thanks to Treasurer Art Graf for all this work, and to Junior Warden Warren Sambach, for keeping the church building in great shape.

<u>Appointment of the New Senior Warden</u> – Fr. Scot announced that he has selected Paul Rank as the next Senior Warden for a one-year term.

<u>Election of the Junior Warden</u> – A motion was made and seconded to elect Ron Kupinski the Junior Warden. Nominations from the floor were requested. There were no other nominations. Mark Dobbins moved to elect Ron Kupinski the Junior Warden by acclamation. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

<u>Introduction of Candidates Nominated for Vestry</u> – Fr. Scot introduced those running for Vestry: Jon Coates, Dina Horsman, Dennis Long, and Mary Longley-Cook, all running for a 3-year term; and Cindy Cohen, Diana Fitzgerald, and James Newhouse, all running for a 2-year term. Nominations from the floor were requested. There were no other nominations.

Introduction of Candidates Nominated for Delegate to the Diocesan Convention – Fr. Scot introduced those running for Diocesan Convention Delegates: Cindy Cohen, Jennie Dobbins, Mark Dobbins, Cheryle Dunkelberg, and Jan Dunkelberg. The motion was made by the Nomination Committee and was seconded. Nominations from the floor were requested. There were no other nominations. Paul Rank moved that the Delegate Candidates be elected by acclamation. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried. The Diocesan Convention is scheduled for October 16 and 17, 2020 in Tucson, Arizona.

<u>Introduction of Candidates Nominated for Alternate Delegate to the Diocesan Convention</u> – Fr. Scot indicated that nominations for Alternate Delegates were open at this time and nominations from the

floor were requested. A motion was made and seconded to nominate Shelly Carley, Candy Wagner, Donna Hartz, Debbie Myrick, and Janyce Schneider Alternate Delegates to the Diocesan Convention. Nancy Bleasdale moved that the Alternate Delegate Candidates be elected by acclamation. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

<u>Appointment of Ballot Counters</u> – Fr. Scot appointed Suzanne Cohen, Bill Deihl and the Rev. Deacon Martha Durham as ballot counters. The Vestry election occurred throughout the meeting.

<u>Election of new Vestry Members</u> – Dina Horsman, Dennis Long, and Mary Longley-Cook were elected each to a 3-year term on the Vestry. Diana Fitzgerald and James Newhouse were elected each to a 1-year term on the Vestry.

<u>Legacy Society Report</u> - Ron Creamer spoke about the opportunity to leave a legacy to the Episcopal Church of the Nativity by adding the church to their will. Thirteen families have added the church to their will. The brochure, "A Gift for Your Loved Ones," a guideline to help plan one's final affairs, was handed out after Ron Creamer's report.

Outreach Report - Paul Rank, Outreach Chair, quoted the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who said 57 years ago, "If the church of today does not recapture the sacrificial spirit of the earlier church, it will lose its authentic ring, forfeit the loyalty of millions, and be dismissed as an irrelevant social club with no meaning for the twentieth century." Paul thanked everyone who helped with outreach during the last year. The 2019 ADVENTure Outreach Fundraiser was a great success. Paul also thanked Bill and Barbara Worthington, who have decided to retire from the outreach committee and for their many years of ministries focusing on outreach. Seven people on the Outreach Committee will be taking over the ministries that the Worthington's led.

<u>Annual Reports</u> – The annual reports are in written form in the annual meeting booklet. Fr. Scot McComas gave the rector's report during the sermon time.

<u>Financial Report</u> – Treasurer Art Graf presented the Financial Report and the 2020 Budget. He indicated that the monthly financial reports are posted monthly on the bulletin board by the restrooms at church. Art also invited people to ask him questions about any detail of the financial report and the 2020 Budget. Some questions from the floor were asked and were answered.

- --Fr. Scot announced new appointments: Tom Durham as Parish Chancellor; Dawn Kast as Parish Historian; Cindy Cohen as Outreach Committee Chair, and Jon Coates as Finance Committee Chair.
- -- The newly elected Vestry will meet immediately after the Annual Meeting to elect a Treasurer and a Clerk.

The Rector's Report

As of the date of the Annual Meeting, January 24, 2021, I have been at The Episcopal Church of the Nativity for 1 year and 5 months. Of the 1 year and 5 months I have served as rector, 7 months have been pre-Covid and 10 months during Covid. I have spent more time working as rector during this pandemic than prior to the pandemic. None of would have ever imagined a world-wide health crisis would change our lives forever.

Regarding our worship, in the 11 weeks from January to mid-March of 2020, we saw an increase in attendance of about 14% over the average of 2019, with an Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) of 184 in those 11 weeks compared to an ASA of 162 in 2019. Then from mid-March to the second week in September the church was in lock-down due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During that time, the church staff stepped up and we all learned how to film our various parts of the service to create a worship experience for the church as all of us navigated this new world.

I am extremely grateful to my clergy colleagues, Associate Rector the Rev. Dr. Wayne Whitney, and the Rev. Deacon Martha Durham, for their tireless dedication to their calling as clergy to help Nativity during these challenging times. Also, Mandy Hodges, our Children, Youth and Family Minister, was active in teaching the rest of the staff how to upload videos, etc. as she put together the weekly Sunday services. Mina Rafferty, our Parish Administrator, was also extremely helpful in working behind the scenes with our bulletins, which shifted to an online format, and going to the church weekly to pay the church bills, check voice mails, and keep the church functional. Dr. Juliana Witt also has been instrumental in making sure that the music program was the best it could be during the recording of music Sunday afternoon for the next Sunday's online service. Her workload seemed to double as she did this and monitored and directed the *Arts at Nativity* program. Mandy, Mina and Juliana along with our clergy have done a stellar job in 2020 making sure we did not turn inward and moan about the pandemic. They all worked long hours diligently to ensure there was a reflective, prayerful, and dedicated worship experience weekly during the lockdown.

The Episcopal Church of the Nativity would not be where it is today without Treasurer Art Graf, who helped the parish navigate the financial world of the pandemic, including the detailed and long hours spent applying for a Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan from the federal government. All the while, Art worked weekly in paying invoices and check reimbursement requests (our Accounts Payable) as well as handling all Accounts Receivable. Art retires this month, having given over a decade of service to Nativity. He deserves a nice, peaceful golf-filled retirement where the only numbers he must focus on is whether he makes a par or birdie on each hole of golf. Please thank Art when you have a chance.

Senior Warden Paul Rank and Junior Warden Ron Kupinski have worked longer hours in 2020 than they normally would do in their volunteer positions as the two senior officers of the parish. The senior warden and rector are co-equals in the structure of the parish, and I am amazed at the constant dedication and many hours Paul Rank has given to Nativity.

Paul advises me on important decisions, and we have a great relationship where we can bounce ideas off of each other for the good of Nativity. I could not have served as well as your rector without the excellence of Senior Warden Paul Rank.

Junior Warden Ron Kupinski has worked behind the scenes on our building, including washing all the windows on the outside in November, working on the roof, the electric parts of the building and grounds and other jobs to keep our building and grounds pristine and in great working order. I would also like to thank Bill Bailey and Pat Shaler for assisting on our property, especially with our electric panels, the sprinklers, and our prayer garden. Ron, Bill, and Pat are the "quiet workers" and most of us do not know

how much they have contributed to our physical plant and grounds. Please thank them when you have a chance.

I have had the honor and pleasure of working with an amazing group of colleagues, all of whom rose to the occasion when we faced the Covid pandemic, including the staff, the church officers, the vestry, and countless volunteers, including Outreach Chair Cindy Cohen and the entire Outreach Committee. Paul Rank addresses this in his report.

Regarding marketing and evangelism, just before Christmas we mailed out 14,500 large postcards to the households within a 5-10 drive from Nativity. We highlighted our children and youth programs as well as our diversity and our excellent music program. Several people who now attend church on a regular basis are our neighbors who tell us they received the postcard. We also had a handful of neighbors who attended the Drive-Thru Christmas Pageant on Christmas Eve, the 6 pm Choral Candlelight service and the Christmas morning Mass. Our motto of *Everyone Is Welcome! No Exceptions* rings true in all that we do and all whom we are.

Our social media presence on Facebook has doubled in a year, from 400 followers in January 2020 to about 825 one year later. People read our posts from 15 different states and 9 foreign countries, including places as far away as Brazil, the Philippines, and Palestine.

Through the Covid-19 shutdown, many of our tenants who use our facilities met online on Zoom and the leaders of the 12-step groups were in constant contact with me inquiring when they could meet in person. The Sylvan Learning Center will soon begin having tutors to meet with students who are falling behind in their studies as the online life of being a student does not work well for every child and teen.

During this time of Covid, a new committee was formed last fall, the Growth and Strengthening Committee of Nativity, led by Jennie Dobbins and Paul Rank. We meet three times a month to strategize and think "outside the box" about how the church can meet people where they are during the pandemic and eventually what it will look like to meet in person again, once the Covid vaccine has been fully made available to the community.

This past fall we have had a focused Stewardship Campaign to fund the 2021 Ministry and Mission Budget. I would like to thank the very capable Stewardship Co-chairs, David Bolger, and Mark Dobbins, who have assisted the vestry and me as we began the 2021 Financial Pledge Campaign in September 2020. Treasurer Art Graf will address the details in his report.

Thank you for your pledge and continuing contributions so we can fund the numerous ministries at Nativity which allow us to have such impeccable programs and continue our worship, evangelism, teaching, outreach, and administration of The Episcopal Church of the Nativity.

Although it has been a wild year, I have been honored to serve as your rector and continue to be amazed at the dedication and faithfulness of our parishioners at The Episcopal Church of the Nativity.

The Senior Warden's Report

This has been quite a year for the Church of Nativity. When I started my tenure as Senior Warden, Fr. Scot was just settling in as our new Rector and we all looked forward to normal church activities, building upon our many strengths in the coming year. But that was not to be. COVID, racial tension, and a highly charged presidential campaign not only impacted the world around us but has had a profound impact on our church.

COVID closed our church but our staff stepped up and did an outstanding job in producing an online service. In-person meetings became unsafe and we all became Zoom experts. The internet has not only allowed our local parishioners to participate in our activities, but has opened our services, meetings, and other activities such as Bible study, Prayer groups, book clubs and the knitting group to those who are traveling, homebound, or away for the winter. When we are back indoors again, we will be broadcasting our services live and continue to use the internet in new and creative ways.

A Regathering Committee was formed to plan the safe reopening of our church and established policies and procedures to minimize the possibility of COVID spread on our campus. The ADVENTure2020 Outreach Fundraiser was certainly different, but it was an outstanding success resulting in the largest income for outreach ever. Cindy Cohen, Kathi Capizzani, Mandy Hodges, Dennis Combs, Jeff Jameson, Ron Kupinski, Juliana Witt, the Nativity Choir, and the Nativity Outreach Committee put together an adventure to remember! The outdoor Christmas Eve Services, highlighted by the Christmas Pageant, brought much needed joy to all of us and to our community.

None of this can replace face to face interactions, but you and the staff have been incredible in making this work.

Racial tension was responded to by holding Zoom meetings on racial reconciliation followed by two well-received courses: Story Sharing and Sacred Ground. In my view, the church is the one place where these issues can be discussed openly and honestly to help guide our future steps.

Like the election four years ago, politics seems to have had an impact on our congregation. Some have said that our church has become too political and has taken positions on things that they do not agree with and have left the church. I grieve their loss. But I think the question should never be are we too political or not, but are we fulfilling God's commandments to love God and our neighbor. If in acting on these commandments we enter the "political" arena, so be it, but I can assure you that I have known many people of different political persuasions who have tried to be faithful to these commandments, worked together, and have had significant positive impact on the world around them. My hope is that we can be unified in our desire to faithfully live out these commandments.

I will miss Dr Juliana Witt as she enters a new phase of her life, but I look forward to seeing her newborn son later this year.

As Norma Hyatt completes her four-year term on the vestry, I would like to thank her. We began serving together on the vestry while Bishop Susan was our Rector, and I will miss her for her contributions and dedication. I would also like to thank the whole vestry for their dedicated work and look forward to working with the new vestry.

Art Graf, our treasurer, has done a great job and has provided wise counsel.

Our Junior Warden, Ron Kupinski, has been outstanding. He has been flexible and has responded to many challenges with great skill and an unsurpassed can-do attitude.

Finally, I would like to thank Fr. Scot for giving me the opportunity to serve as your Senior Warden.

The Music Director's Report

What a year! The hardest year ever for many of us, yet we still did so much! Getting church online in the spring was a huge feat for us, but we managed to do it with our great team and a lot of creativity! Learning new technology skills for this process required new levels of flexibility, teamwork and innovation and brought the staff closer together.

Despite what this year and pandemic as meant for the arts as a whole in the world, Nativity managed to keep our music program going online, still support some local musicians with work and special projects, and continue *Arts at Nativity* virtually, resulting in no losses financially. It's incredible how you all as a congregation stand behind the arts, recognizing that in a time like this, we need the arts even more! I know many churches that have not had any kind of ensembles meeting online and have even had to lay off musicians.

Choir has held together as a community, meeting almost every week to check in on each other. We also did a virtual Vacation Bible School, music in a few children's chapels (way to go Mandy for your amazing, ongoing work with the children!) and an Everybody Ensemble online. We also had a beautiful set of Schulmerich handbells donated anonymously to us in the spring right before Covid hit the country. The timing could not have been more perfect! We successfully launched our handbell ensemble in September and have had tons of fun together learning how to ring!

Our fall festival in October was lots of fun, featuring the Willow String Quartet. The year culminated with a beautiful outdoor Christmas Eve pageant, which was so creative and fun but meaningful, and also an outdoor service with a live, distanced choir, which was so incredibly special!

Arts At Nativity has continued this 2020-2021 season, thanks to your faithful support and we have brought unique virtual concerts not only to our patrons, but our community partners. This also means that you have also supported local valley artists, contributing to the suffering artist scene. We are including our 2nd year of Emerging Artist Concerts and three new Young Artists on the series! We will again partner with a school, the expecting mother's unit of Honor Health Hospital, and several retirement communities as part of our Community Engagement Program. These projects and concerts have opened new kinds of relationship-building with the community that we hope to continue to foster and maintain.

Lastly, you all know that at the end of 2020, I stepped down as music director. The love and support you all poured out was so meaningful to Galen and me as we look forward to the arrival of our little guy in April. THANK YOU for all the kind words, gifts and love that you showed us. The Children, Youth and Families Ministries Report

The normal Children & Youth gatherings in January and February 2020 were similar in scope and size as they were in 2019. Beginning in March with the pandemic shutdown, we moved to an online forum. These are the highlights of that:

Online Children's Chapel - Average attendance: 6-12

Children from ages 4 to 12 are invited to participate in our online Children's Chapel. From March 15 through the end of May, Children's Chapel was a video lesson and prayers that families could watch in their own time. Since June, Children's Chapel has been weekly online gatherings through Zoom, meeting at 9:30 am each Sunday morning. We have regular weekly attendance by many children and several children who "drop-in" every other week or once a month.

Middle School Youth Group - Average attendance: 2-3

Amid the pandemic gathering cancellations, an online Youth Group for grades 6 through 8 was established. This is a new group for Nativity and has been small but consistent over the past several months. This is a time for checking in, life conversations, and games.

<u>High School Youth Group - Average attendance: 2-5</u>

A Youth Group gathering for grades 9 through 12 meets each week online via Zoom, Sundays at 11:30 am. This is a time for checking in, life conversations, and games.

Youth Confirmation Classes

This past spring we hosted online Youth Confirmation Classes. We met via Zoom on Sundays at 1:00 pm. We had 4 middle school students complete the course, which ran for 8 weeks. Special teachers/guest speakers during the course included Father Scot McComas, Deacon Martha Durham, Senior Warden Paul Rank, Ryan Tritch, and Music Director Juliana Witt. Students are awaiting the postponed Diocesan Confirmation Service. When this is rescheduled, Nativity will joyfully participate in support of our new youth confirmands!

Nativity Growth and Strengthening Committee

The Committee was formed for the purpose of examining Nativity's membership in light of the radical challenges and opportunities of today's Covid restrictions and politically charged atmosphere. The objective is to identify and build on our strengths, to design and implement (with the approval of the Vestry) specific projects that will increase the number of people/families who actively participate in listening to the word of God, enjoying the fellowship of God's people and going in peace to share the love of Christ.

The following areas are currently being targeted and a form has been created to measure success of actions taken:

- Youth and Young Professionals: Aaron Graves has been appointed as the new leader. Regular meetings will be scheduled and advertised in church bulletins as well as by direct contact.
- New and unchurched people within Nativity's geographic area: In addition to success with current parishioners, the on-line services have identified a group of local and out-of-town seekers who seem interested but hesitant to enter an environment they find unfamiliar or suspicious. The church created and sent out 14,500 Christmas mailers to the church's surrounding 5-mile radius in mid-December. Numerous new people attended the December 24, 25 and following Sunday services.
- Retirement Homes: Current Covid restrictions prevented plans to take music programs, etc. to the residents. Ideas will be reexamined as soon as restrictions allow and Nativity members who are residents of VI Silverstone, VI Grayhawk, Sagewood and Mirabella will be included in discussions.
- Current Ministries and Fellowship Activities: How might individual groups benefit from the proposed hybrid (in person/on line) conference capability? A grant has been requested from the National Church to help fund this; we should hear something by the end of January.
- New Interest Groups: A Meet-Up online account will be sponsored and maintained for the LGBTQ+ community and other interest-based groups. Current ministries and activities will also be able to use this vehicle.
- Include Others: Extend the hand of fellowship beyond our largely white, middle class boundaries by purposefully seeking friendship and forming relationships with people who do not necessarily look or think as we do. A subcommittee is currently being formed.
